Citizenship Day 2020 WBro Etienne Roserie

Citizenship Day, was tradition for Whitehall #761, and since 2019, has become the tradition of Reynoldsburg #340. We have the honor of witnessing the Naturalization Ceremony, and hosting a reception for new US citizens. We will provide cake, punch, and certificates of congratulations, honoring their accomplishment. The efforts of legal immigrants, and the naturalization process they complete to become a part of the mosaic of our great nation is not an easy task and deserves recognition.

Enacted by the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act (McCarran-Walter Act), once an immigrant obtains their green card, they need to know and learn English, need to have lived in the United States for at least five years, and are required to pass a US civics test. This also includes navigating through years of patience-testing paperwork. The reward, is the privilege of becoming a member of our great nation. For the 2019 year, Reynoldsburg brethren and their families witnessed the swearing-in of 65 petitioners, from 34 countries. Many attending the event for the first time, were moved by the experience and endeavor to share the impact it had on them throughout their travels.

Citizenship Day is a key piece of community outreach celebrated on the 2nd Tuesday of March annually, and was conceived in 1991 by Brother Joseph David Wines of Whitehall Lodge. The event is arranged in partnership with Federal Deputy Francis Green, who has been a liaison at the Federal Courthouse downtown Columbus (Southern District of Ohio) for many years.



From the Lodge Education Officer Bro Charles Ashley

To a new Master Mason the wide world of Masonry may be a bit bewildering. Masonry branches out into a compendium of other Masonic organizations - The Scottish Rite, The York Rite, the Grotto, The Odd Fellows, the Shrine and the list goes on. Enthusiastic Brothers will ask the new Mason to petition their Masonic body. Sometimes to many choices are no choices. What to make of this? Is there a commonality among them all? I would like to offer the opinion that all the bodies owe their allegiance to just one foundation document, the Alpha and Omega of all things Masonry, our Cipher and Ritual.

Our Ritual book is well worn as we have used and studied it for countless hours, memorizing the cipher, and learning the lectures and passages. The Ritual is the foundation – set in stone, immutable and unalterable. We take seriously the admonishment to never change the ritual; never to pollute it or let it be diluted by change.

Historically, that is not true. It has never been set in stone. The Ritual has been an ever-evolving document as have Masonry. Shortly after the formation of the Grand Lodge of England the Ancient Charges was compiled and printed by Dr. James Anderson. It was known as Anderson's Constitution and published in 1723. Prior to 1717 there is no record that Freemasonry consisting of more than one degree. Scholars agree that between 1723 and in only 7 years, 1730, the second and third degrees were created. Were they just made up? Were the rituals influenced by Renaissance thought? Did they reflect the social and theological thoughts of the time? Over the remaining year, the Educational program will delve into these issues, explore the documents and manuscripts before Anderson's Constitution and follow the Ritual's evolution from England to the colonies and finally to Ohio.

Trustees Report

The elected Trustees this year are WB Dave Gubanc (term expiring in 2020), WB Etienne Roserie, (term expiring in 2021) and Bro. Christopher Baer (term expiring in 2022). After a successful November and December we look forward to a full schedule of meetings, ritual work and continued use of the building by appendant bodies and others that meet on a regular or periodic basis. We have surveyed many of the non-profit organizations in the Reynoldsburg and Pickerington area that own buildings, and our daily rental rate of \$50 for members is one of the lowest in the area. Details on how to arrange daily rentals for any family or community event can be found elsewhere in this issue of the Trestleboard.

As the use of the lodge increases, the need for more maintenance, cleaning and storage capacity also increases. It is therefore the duty of the Trustees to assure that duplicate assets and items no longer needed or used and subsequently taking up valuable storage space are declared excess and sold, traded, recycled or disposed as soon as possible. It is also important that all our members know that the lodge is not a depository for personal items, nor should items be lent to the lodge with the expectation that they will be returned if they are no longer needed. It is not possible for the Trustees to keep track of such items and assure they don't get mixed in with assets that were purchased or donated for the lodge's use.

At this time the lodge has several items for sale on ebay, the list of which can be obtained from the Trustees, or viewed at the lodge. Excess assets are added every month, per the current standing resolutions.
